Mercy Ships Mosquito Net Appeal

Olveston School is proud to be supporting the fundraising of St. Mary's Church for the Net-Work appeal.

Pancakes and Paintings

As you may know, St Mary's Church is raising £10,000 to buy 2225 mosquito nets for Mercy Ships. At the launch we heard from volunteers working with patients recovering from surgery in the Recuperation Centre that they were repeatedly asked for mosquito nets to take home, but did not have them to give. These nets are high quality and protect families, and children in particular, from malaria, which kills millions of children annually.

One of our fund-raising events will be 'Pancakes and Paintings' to be held on Shrove Tuesday 8th March, in church. At least ten local artists are donating pictures and we will sell a hundred tickets at £10 each, thus everyone has a one in ten chance of owning an original painting. (Should we have more paintings more tickets could be sold, but the winning ratio will never be higher than 1 in 10.) The paintings will be on view from Sunday 6th March in church, and the draw will take place during a social evening on Tuesday.





Weather Record October to December 2010







October A boisterous start to the month, with very heavy rain and strong winds. This lasted for nearly the first week, after which more benign conditions returned with sunshine and showers. The middle fortnight of the month was very dry, with little rain, and on the 25th a cold Northerly wind blew, bringing sub-zero temperatures. After two days, Westerly winds returned, bringing some rain. Rainfall for the month was nearly an inch below average, whilst temperature and pressure were marginally below norm.

November A wet and windy start to the month, with a very low barometric pressure of 962mb occurring on the 8th. Atlantic low pressure systems continued to pass over us until the 21st when an extremely large high pressure system built to the east of Greenland and stretched across the Atlantic as far as Norway blocking out all the Atlantic systems. A low centred over Denmark brought extremely cold Arctic air over us with night time frosts and 2cm of snow at the month's end. Rainfall for the month was just over an inch below normal and average pressure and temperature were well below normal. The latter was 1.75°C below average. We had four gales in the month.

December The month started very cold with severe night frosts which continued until the 10th, when slightly warmer air made inroads into the high pressure which had established itself. This continued for seven days, when the cold weather returned, with snow on three occasions, totalling 5.3cm, which was still lying on Christmas Day. Following Boxing Day, a thaw occurred, with slightly warmer conditions to the month's end.

Average rainfall was about 21/4 inches below normal and pressure was marginally low, but temperature was 4.5°C below average making this the coldest December for about a hundred years.

Commentary

January was an extremely cold month with significant snow. These conditions continued into February and whilst March was dry it continued cold with Northerly or Easterly winds. April had some changeable days but the middle of the month was dry and sunny. Early May was cold for the time of year but it warmed up later in the month and the warmth continued into June with a long period of dry weather in the middle of the month. July was a more typical summer month of sunshine and showers, but August brought very wet conditions with rain on most days. Early September was warm and dry but became wet and cold later in the month. October started with gales then sunshine and showers, with mid month being very dry. November was wet and windy at the beginning but became dry and cold at the month end, with snow. December was a very dry and cold month with severe night frosts and snow lying on Christmas Day. It was also the coldest December for about a hundred years.

In summary, this was the driest year since 2003, being approximately 8 inches below average rainfall, and the coldest since 1981, with a particularly cold January and December. We had gales on seven days and snow on twelve days.

Severn Neighbourhood Policing Area received 46 calls to the police, which included 23 reported crimes for the month of December. Two properties were burgled; one in the village of Hill and another in the village of Tockington; personal property was taken, including jewellery, laptops, ipods. If you have jewellery that you don't wear often or is of sentimental value, it's a good idea to keep it somewhere safe, for example in a box in the loft. The Severn beat has suffered a number of attempted outbuilding breaks, where mountain bike, golf clubs, power tools and an off road motorbike have been stolen

Two birds, one Heron and a Muscovy Duck, have been killed in the duck pond, Catherine Hill, Olveston. It would appear that they were shot with an air weapon. If anyone recalls seeing anything out of the ordinary, please contact us.

Our Parish Matters

While your Parish Councillors offer you all an embarrassingly late message of goodwill and best wishes for your New Year, there are already issues to be dealt with. We have all suffered in the grip of the coldest and snowiest winter for a hundred years, making movement a bit of a problem and yet more local travel difficulties beset us to make matters worse.

Many people may already realise that scheduled council work to create a footpath between Oldown and Alveston, in the Pump Lane, Limegrove area, has necessitated road closure for a likely six weeks or more, starting on January 17th. With Strode Common effectively closed off to traffic, we should use the A38 to and from Thornbury, via Washingpool Lane or The Down and Down Road as possible alternatives. While regretting any inconvenience suffered, the obvious advantage will be that our youngsters going on foot, to and from their local school, will have much safer journeys in the future.

Rod Williams' lofty frame can often be seen around the Parish and this very approachable man may be contacted personally, or on 01454 612850, if you have any concerns or queries about local footpaths, now that he has become our footpath warden.

With the threat that local public telephone boxes might be removed, the Parish Council has decided to purchase the red box in Tockington for a nominal sum in order to retain it as part of part of the visual amenity, though it will be non-operational. If no useful suggestions are received about any additional use it can be put to, the box will be permanently sealed up.

The modern phone box in Olveston will be run viably as per usual but we will release details of any arrangements for the future use of the phone box at Old Down soon.

Prayer for the Sick

In the Catholic Church we keep the 11th February as World Day of Prayer for the Sick. This day is chosen because it happens to be the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes

You may know that in 1858 Our Lady appeared to St Bernadette at Lourdes on eighteen separate occasions. Since then it has become a place of tremendous prayer and healing particularly for the sick.

Six million pilgrims visit Lourdes every year making it the second most popular destination for visitors in France after Paris. Our own parish of Christ the King in Thornbury has organised a pilgrimage there in May this year which will be led by my colleague Father Richard.

People go to Lourdes to pray, to find peace and to bathe in the healing waters. Occasionally there are miracles and over the years there have been about seventy such cases which have been recognised by a special team of doctors as having no explainable cure.

But it is not for a cure that most people go to Lourdes. They go to experience pilgrimage, to give time to God and to experience spiritual refreshment.

It is good that throughout the world we remember the sick in prayer on this special feast day. Those who suffer illness whether it is of body, mind or spirit certainly need our practical support but they also need our prayers. They need to know that they are not forgotten and that they are frequently brought before the Lord by their brothers and sisters in the human family. This gives them much comfort and hope.

Our Lady of Lourdes, pray for us.
